Plans for 2022

Maybe you have some resolutions for the new year. The Board would like to share some of the plans for Sagamore in the new year.

Winter

- Trim back the wooded areas around our properties so that the grass can be cut closer to the woods.
- Prune trees in the center area as needed.
- Landscape Committee will review the overall plantings plan for the community to determine priorities and establish phases by year.

Spring

- Install concrete at some locations that need replacement. List has been put together.
- Implement major capital project to line / replace rusting storm water lines to and from the retention basins as required by the Township. Expected cost \$130,000 +.
- Continue with the Landscaping Committee walks and development of plans.
- Walk with a team to identify any maintenance issues that are outside homes and the responsibility of homeowners.
- Review the need for any driveway repairs or other maintenance / capital projects.

Summer

Inspect all maintenance issues that have been taken care of by homeowners.

Fall

- Plant new shrubs / trees per the overall Landscaping phased plan.
- Get bids for an updated engineering capital reserve study to be done in 2023.


Please remember to pick up after your dog. Walking through what's left out there is not fun.

Our snow contractor is Weaver. **Tom Swift** is managing their work when they are on-site.


Remember our speed limit on Lake George Circle is only **15 mph**. The Board is considering what other changes can be made to ensure safety.





Fire Pits at Sagamore

It is important for everyone's safety to follow what is in the Rules and Regulations at Sagamore which are as follows:

6. General Use M. No above ground tank of gas or other flammable liquid may be maintained on any lot, except for propane gas grills and propane fire pits. Only propane fire pits are allowed in Sagamore. Fire pits must be placed on a non-combustible fire pit pad and must be a pedestal type (raised on legs) to allow for appropriate ventilation on a deck. The pit must be placed away from walls, overhangs, and any flammable material. A fire extinguisher must be available and no cooking will be allowed in the pit.

N. No burning of trash, leaves, or other material is permitted in the common elements. No wood burning is permitted anywhere on the property. Open flames of any kind are not permitted. Butane lamps, chimineas, lighted torches, fuel-filled torches, etc. are not permitted.


This is not a new Rule / Reg. Living in a townhouse community puts the responsibility on each of us to ensure the safety of not only our own house but those of others. Propane can be turned off. Wood burns with embers that travel and cannot be extinguished completely quickly.



Another Rules and Regulations Reminder. 6. General Use. Holiday decorations are permitted to be displayed two (2) weeks prior to the holiday and must be removed within two (2) weeks after the holiday. Exceptions are: 1) Halloween decorations are permitted to be displayed beginning October 1 but must be removed by November 14. 2) Christmas / Holiday decorations, including holiday lighting, are permitted after Thanksgiving and must be removed no later than January 15.

Here's what you can do to use less water in your everyday life, starting now:

In the bathroom

- 1. Turn the faucet off when brushing teeth or shaving.
- 2. Stop using the toilet as an ashtray or wastebasket.
- 3. Take shorter showers.
- 4. Drop a plastic bottle filled with sand or pebbles into the toilet tank to trick the toilet into filling up with less water.
- 5. Install water saving showerheads and flow restrictors.

In the kitchen

- 1. Use the dishwasher and washing machine for full loads only.
- 2. Scrape food off plates instead of rinsing before placing them in the dishwasher.
- 3. Dip fruits and veggies in a bowl of cold water or clean sink to clean them instead of running the faucet.
- Keep a container of drinking water in the fridge instead of running the tap until the H2O gets cold.

In the yard

- 1. Don't use hose water to push around leaves and debris in the gutter or the yard. Use a broom, dustpan and muscles.
- 2. Water outdoor plants only when needed.
- 3. Wash the car with water from a bucket instead of from a hose. Consider a commercial car wash that recycles water.

In general

- 1. Check faucets, hoses and pipes for leaks. Then stop them.
- 2. Drink tap water (filter if you want) and carry a reusable water bottle.

Lenape Road?

The Lenape (English: /ləˈnɑːpi/, /ˈlɛnəpi/, or Lenape IPA: [ləˈnɑːpe]), also called the Leni Lenape, Lenni Lenape and Delaware people, are an indigenous people of the Northeastern Woodlands, who live in the United States and Canada. Their historical territory included present-day northeastern Delaware, New Jersey and eastern Pennsylvania along the Delaware River watershed, New York City, western Long Island, and the Lower Hudson Valley. Today, Lenape people belong to the Delaware Nation and Delaware Tribe of Indians in Oklahoma; the Stockbridge-Munsee Community in Wisconsin; and the Munsee-Delaware Nation, Moravian of the Thames First Nation, and Delaware of Six Nations in Ontario.

During the last decades of the 18th century, most Lenape were removed from their homeland by expanding European colonies. The divisions and troubles of the American Revolutionary War and United States' independence pushed them farther west. In the 1860s, the United States government sent most Lenape remaining in the eastern United States to the Indian Territory (present-day Oklahoma and surrounding territory) under the Indian removal policy. In the 21st century, most Lenape now reside in Oklahoma, with some other communities in Wisconsin and Ontario.

Sagamore

Did you know?

- Sagamore Hill in Oyster Bay New York was the home of Theodore Roosevelt, 26th President of the United States, from 1885 until his death in 1919. Known as the Summer White House.
- The Sagamore Resort on Lake George is a landmark hotel with a prestigious history that dates back to the 1880s. The Sagamore opened its doors in 1883 with luxurious Lake George accommodations that attracted a select, international clientele, and quickly became the social epicenter for the wealthy residents of Green Island and Millionaires' Row.
- Sagamore: a subordinate chief of the Algonquin Indians.
- Sagamore, Armstrong County, Pennsylvania. The new coal town of Sagamore literally sprang up in a period of four years after the extension of the railroad into the area in 1904. The necessary mine buildings were completed in 1908. William Hays built a 60-room hotel, Hyde-Murphy Company built ninety homes and the Keystone Company Store was constructed in 1905-1908. The first post office was opened on December 7, 1908. By 1913, 806 men were employed and the annual coal production was 600,000 tons. A theatre was constructed in 1916. At the Sagamore Hotel (which burned down in 2005) a passerby can still find a good cup of coffee and good conversation, and imagine the days when, in the words of Norman Coy, "There was no place like Sagamore!"
